What is the Partners Program?

Partnership between CNIB and public libraries in Alberta to expand accessible library service to people with print disabilities

Partners Program in Alberta

- Over 15,000 DAISY titles in deposit collections in 96 libraries
- Plus 15,000 titles circulated through ILL
- Over 200 staff from 110 libraries trained
- Libraries received over 20,000 promotional items











CNIB Library collection

Physical formats:

- DAISY audio books on CD
- Braille & printbraille books
- Descriptive movies

And online:

- Downloadable MP3 and DAISY audio
- Online newspapers & magazines
- Databases






Who can access the program?

Anyone who has trouble reading regular print due to:

- learning disability (dyslexia, some forms of autism, etc.)
- physical disability (severe arthritis, stroke, MS, etc.)
- visual disability (blindness or partial sight)











Support for accessible programs

- Book clubs & community reads programs
- TD Summer Reading Club
- Free promotional materials for outreach: bookmarks & posters
